# Millennium High School

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## School District and Community

Millennium High School is part of a three charter schools and a preschool complex ranging in grades Pre-Kindergarten to 12 referred to as the Tracy Learning Center. The total enrollment for 2019-20 is 1,298 students. Tracy is a diverse community of approximately 87,000 people centrally located to the San Francisco Bay Area and Sacramento. The ethnic makeup of our student population is: 53% Hispanic, 24% White, 7% African American, 9% Asian, and 7% Other.

## History

The Tracy Learning Center vision encompassed a continuous educational program for students PreK - 12. The focus is to present a new and fresh approach to education that would personalize the learning process and bring greater depth and understanding using technology, broad based curriculum planning and projects. The Tracy Learning Center began in 2001 with Discovery Charter School in grades 5 and 6 and progressed to include grades 7 and 8. Three years later, the Tracy Learning Center began Primary Charter School which now includes grades TK to 4, and Millennium High School. Primary Charter Preschool was added in 2015. With these expansions, the student body has grown from 75 students to over 1,200 students today.

## Charter Status

The original charter for Discovery was approved by the Tracy Unified School District in 2001 and renewed in April of 2016. The charter for Millennium High School was most recently renewed in 2019 by the same board for an additional five year term.

## School

Millennium High School, the fourth school in the PreK - 12 continuum, opened in 2004 with freshmen and added a class each year. For the 2019-20 school year the enrollment is 544 students and a staff of 34 teachers, two counselors, a counseling intern, and a counseling office manager. The student to faculty ratio is 15:1. The school year is 205 days including a mandatory five week summer program. The focus of the high school is to fully prepare students for a successful life beyond high school which includes: academic preparation for higher education, career exploration including an internship, and a social commitment through a 200 hour community service requirement. In 2017, U.S. News' Best High Schools Ranking awarded MHS the bronze medal, based on state testing results across demographics, graduation rate, and levels of college preparation.

## ACADEMICS: 2019 – 2020

There are three educational course sequences for students to follow that all lead to some form of higher education: Early College, College Prep, and Community College or Vocational Training preparation. Early College pathway students are expected to begin taking college classes by the summer of their tenth grade year. They gain experience learning in a college classroom environment. This pathway provides more time for college classes than the College Prep pathway which includes students who are following a more traditional college prep high school program. **Millennium does not offer AP, IB, or Honors courses. Rather, we encourage students showing academic excellence to take classes at a local community college through a reduced schedule in their junior and senior year and full tuition reimbursement for successfully completed coursework.** Juniors and seniors take a minimum of four courses which can include college classes. Students earn 5 credits for passing each semester course at Millennium. They earn 10 elective credits for each community college course successfully completed, and receive a weighted grade included in their GPA. College prep courses have been approved by the University of California Articulation Department. Technology is used for research, presentations, and writing in all classrooms. Project based learning is part of all curriculum areas for all course sequences.

## Millennium Course Selection

**English:** English 1P, 2P, 3P, and 4P

**Social Studies:** Geography, World History, U.S. History, American Government, Economics

**Science:** Integrated Science, Biology, Chemistry, Environmental Science, Forensic Science, Anatomy and Physiology

**Fine Arts:** Art, Drama, Beginning Band, Advanced Band, Choir, Film Production

**Language Other Than English:** Spanish 1, 2, and 3 and American Sign Language 1, 2, and 3

**Electives:** Technical Construction, Computer Programming 1 and 2, Academic Decathlon, Speech/Debate, Leadership, Color Guard, Life Design, Media Marketing, Resource Support, Teacher’s Aide (**Note:** these electives are not meant to be college preparatory, but rather for enrichment. Most college bound students do not take these electives, but instead take the Foreign Language and Community College courses.)

**Additional Courses:** Physical Education, Life Skills, Career Pathways 10, Career Education, Internship Seminar, Community Service

## Grading/Class Rank

- Students must earn a C- or better in order to receive credit for a class
- D’s & F’s receive no credit and must be repeated
- Class rank is determined by the Grade Point Average (GPA) of all high school credit courses taken through the end of junior year
- Millennium weights grades for Academic Decathlon class and college courses
- All college courses are included on student transcripts and are factored into their GPA

## College Credit Earned

Students pursuing a more rigorous course load take advantage of the opportunity to attend classes at the community college. Below is a table showing the average number of credits earned:
